For example, it has been way more than a year since we started to look forward to the McMinnville Garden Club's celebration of its 20th Year of hosting the very successful McMinnville Garden Tour and Garden Faire. It should have happened last June except that pesky Covid-19 got in the way and we had to cancel.

The Good News is that we now appear to be back on schedule for **Sunday, June 27, 2021.**

Covid remains a serious concern and will likely cause a few more false starts before it is behind

us, but as faithful gardeners, we are committed to continue to plant and are eagerly looking forward to the harvest.

Five amazing gardens have been selected for this year’s Garden Tour and 39 of our Garden Faire vendors have already said they are eager to return. We do anticipate we will adopt the “relaxed” space layout that the Farmers Market group will be using, and that will give us fewer vendor spaces to sell, but we will have better pedestrian flow and viewing of the plants and other goods being offered for sale.

Let’s start with “the day.” We will need “all hands-on deck” so please look at your calendar now and clear the date...and please plan for the whole day. It is okay to also volunteer your spouse and other family members. They will enjoy it.

We will have our usual pre-Garden Tour visit for workers and volunteers on Saturday so you won’t miss seeing the beauty of the gardens and, of course, you will want to save some time to shop our Garden Faire vendors on Sunday. Beyond that there are jobs for everyone that can match your energy level. We will need hosts in the gardens, ticket sellers in the Garden Club booth, helpers to assist our vendors, “happy faces” to be available to answer questions and to direct folks, and more. You get the idea? Many of us will have more than one job during the day and together we will make our 20th Year magnificent.

Lead-up activities are also varied and they, too, will require the involvement of us all. There will be a variety of sub-committees charged with specific tasks and you will be given ample opportunity to assist where you are able. Beyond that it is now time to share the event (and the date, **June 27th**) with your neighbors and friends. Meanwhile I enjoy crocheting, creating baskets from pine needles, knitting and a little embroidery. Right now, I am diving back into macramé (cue the 70's) with rug wool and if I am lucky, really will become a rug.

Perhaps we will see each other at a garden club meeting in person, sometime in 2021. Stay well and keep in touch with each other. Friendships are an important part of the club!
