PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Now that the Holiday Season has passed, we all feel that renewed sense of energy that comes with the anticipation of the seasons ahead. Even though all may seem quiet in your garden, there is plenty of work to be done! With all of the leaves of your deciduous plants gone, January is a great time to make plans for designing your garden. This "blank canvas", so to speak, will allow you to see where you should take away or add new plants, or even create a new pathway or garden structure. It is also a great time to test the PH of your soil, as some soil amendments, such as lime, can take several months to have an effect. You can begin planting dormant bare root perennials, such as container grown roses, and summer & fall blooming perennial bulbs. Dormant hostas, asters, phlox and other perennials may be dug up and divided now. If you plan on growing vegetables this year, you can begin starting seeds indoors for lettuce, snap peas, and other March planting crops. Hardy evergreen and fruit trees may be planted now; just be sure to keep them watered during any dry spells! For your existing trees and shrubs, now is a great time to do some pruning in anticipation of the growing season ahead, as pruning in winter will slow unwanted growth. Don't forget to practice self-care this month, as it will be

important as ever to make sure you don't injure yourself while working in your gardens. I find that yoga is a great resource for building strength and flexibility for all ages and levels. I would highly recommend **Yoga With Adriene**, available on *YouTube*. She is a wonderful instructor, with hundreds of videos for all kinds of practices – and it's totally free and easy to do in the comfort of your own homes! Please let me know if you decide to give her a try and what you think! Take care...

*Poster Distribution: place event posters throughout the community at key location, information available from past years.

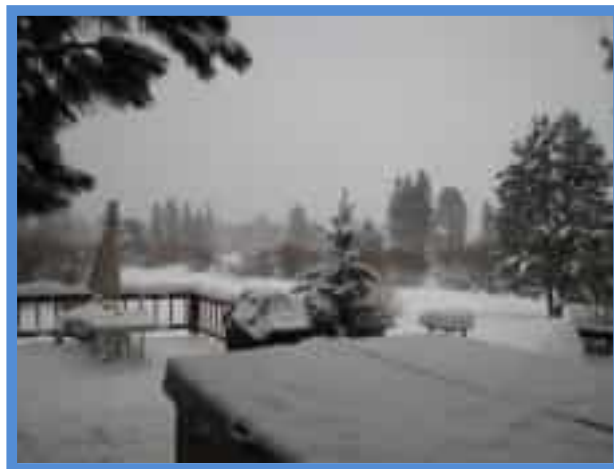
*Horticulture Committee: visit selected gardens on tour and identify key plant materials within the garden. Create signage to share with visitors about unique/unusual plants in the gardens.
